Prosthodontic Protocols and Prerequisites in Modification of the Occlusal Vertical Dimension

With an aging population, there is an increase in the number of patients who want to retain teeth for life. Quality of life is also very important to these patients. Unfortunately, many of these patients have been heavily restored and have lost occlusal vertical dimension (OVD) and often have a collapsed dentition with limited intermaxillary space for restoration. For such patients understanding the protocols and phasing of treatment to enable an increase in the OVD and a reorganisation of the occlusion is important. Not all clinicians will feel comfortable with undertaking such treatment but an understanding of the process is none-the-less of benefit when examining and consulting with such patients.

The attendee will:

- understand the reasons for increasing the occlusal vertical dimension.
- learn protocols for undertaking this task and what are some of the pitfalls.
- learn how phased treatment is used to provide a successful outcome.

Gilbert Watson graduated in 1984 with a BDS from the University of Otago. He then spent 14 years in private practice before returning to Otago to complete a 3-year Prosthodontic Masters. On returning to Auckland he established a specialist private practice and has recently completed two-year tenure as the President of the New Zealand Academy of Prosthodontists and Restorative Dentists.

Clinical Therapeutic Strategies for the Prophylactic and Active Intervention of Salivary Hypofunction: A Modern Perspective

Dry mouth is a common problem, with many causes. It causes many symptoms including difficulty eating, communicating, a burning sensation or bad taste and it frequently gives rise to dental disease, oral mucosal infections and salivary gland disorders. This lecture will review the causes, detection, complications and management strategies of salivary hypofunction.

Delegates will be able to:

- have an appreciation of the many diverse causes of reduced salivary flow.
- detect and investigate for possible underlying causes of dry mouth.
- develop strategies to reduce the likelihood of complications of salivary hypofunction and to provide good symptomatic relief.
- understand patients' concerns in relation to management of chronic disease and be able to provide supportive care.

Anita is an Oral Medicine Specialist and Professor of Oral Medicine at AUT University, Department of Oral Health. She qualified first as a doctor and later as a dentist. She completed her Oral Medicine specialist training at the Eastman Dental Institute, London. She and her family moved to New Zealand in 2009. Her research interests include the genetic and prognostic significance of oral lesions in Crohn's Disease, salivary gland disease and the impact of vitamin D on oral health.
